## **INFORMATION REQUEST REFERENCE 16045**

Thank you for your information request, received on [Date]. You asked the London Legacy Development Corporation (Legacy Corporation) to provide the following information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA):

- 1. The total cost of the project (Stadium wrap) and the amount being funded by E20 (i.e. public money)
- The business case, whether as a document or in another format, showing the assessment of affordability and the demonstration of an acceptable return on investment for the taxpayer.

In relation to your first question, the procurement of the various aspects of the wrap are not yet complete and as such the total cost of this project is being withheld under section 43(2) Commercial Interests.

## S.43(2) - Commercial interests.

(2) Information is exempt information if its disclosure under this Act would, or would be likely to, prejudice the commercial interests of any person (including the public authority holding it).

The section 43(2) is a qualified exemption and subject to the prejudice test and the public interest test. Under the prejudice test we have to consider if disclosure of this information would, or would be likely to, prejudice our commercial interests or the commercial interests of a third party.

Consideration is also given to the harm disclosing this information would be likely to cause, combined with other information already in the public domain (mosaic effect) or possibly released at a future date (precedent effect). The public interest test considers and balances the public interest in disclosing this information against the public interest in not disclosing this information and uses this assessment to decide whether there is sufficient justification in withholding this information under this exemption.

Information disclosed under the FOIA is considered to be public information, and while there is a presumption towards disclosure, consideration needs to be given as to who will have access to this information beyond the requestor and the purposes for which they could use the information.

The Legacy Corporation have assessed the impact of releasing the information withheld in this request under this exemption. There is, of course, a public interest in promoting transparency of the decisions and accountability in regards to the agreements that are entered into by public sector bodies. However, the disclosure of the information on the wrap, which is currently being procured and is under negotiation, would prejudice commercial interests of the Stadium operator London Stadium 185 and E20 because it will reveal information which would impact on current negotiations.

It is the view of the Legacy Corporation that, at this time, the public interest in withholding the information outweighs the public interest in disclosing it.

In relation to your second question, a paper which includes the business case has recently been taken to the E20 Board. With the procurement underway as well as discussions with third parties ongoing, this paper is currently being withheld under section 43(2) Commercial interests, as to release the information within this paper at this time would be likely to prejudice the commercial interests of E20.

E20 have assessed the impact of releasing the information withheld in this request under this exemption. There is, of course, a public interest in promoting transparency of the decisions and accountability in regards to the agreements that are entered into by public sector bodies. However, the disclosure of the paper which includes the business case on the wrap, which is currently being procured and is under negotiation, would prejudice commercial interests of the Stadium operator London Stadium 185 and E20 because it will reveal information which would impact on current negotiations.

It is the view of the Legacy Corporation that, at this time, the public interest in withholding the information outweighs the public interest in disclosing it.
